- 1. BID FORM: Replace sheet number 11 "Bid Form" front page only, with attached revised sheet number 11 "Bid Form" in this addendum as Attachment 1.
- 2. PLANS AND DRAWINGS: Replace City Standard <u>Drawing No. S-25.2</u>, <u>Sidewalk Transition</u> with attached County of Riverside <u>Standard Drawing No. 812</u> in this addendum as Attachment 2.
- 3. PLANS AND DRAWINGS: Add attached City of Palm Springs' <u>Mailbox Installation Detail</u> Drawing No. 903 incorporated into the contract documents as Attachment 3.
- 4. BID FORM: Item No. 7 Clarification Remove and Replace Existing Driveway Approach up to the existing R/W. Driveway approach shall be 6" of Class II Aggregate Base over a minimum of 6" of 560-C-3250 PCC.

## **III. Questions:**

1. Item No. 12 - For bidding purposes specify CalTrans Ramp Case A, B or C. Clarify ramp limits, from BCR to ECR or inside grooves only? Are these the NE and SE ramps in Shady Ln presented in project walk?

Response: Existing ADA Ramps shall be removed from BCR to ECR. Construct New ADA Ramps per Caltrans Std. Plan RSP A88A Case "C" and install Wet set <u>Yellow</u> Truncated Panels per CALDAG. Contractor shall sawcut, remove and replace existing curb at "Spandrel" Flow Line. New Curb shall be constructed to meet Caltrans Std. Plan RSP A88A Case "C" and CALDAG requirements. All removals shall be field verified with contract and City representative. The ramps in question will be on the NE and NW corners of Araby Avenue that were presented in the Site Walk.

2. Item No. 5 – Sidewalk detail S-25.1 and S-25.3 keynote 6 states sidewalk is to be placed on 2" sand/ 10 mil visqueen. Please confirm no aggregate base is required under sidewalk.

Response: Class II Aggregate Base is "NOT" required under sidewalk which is "NOT" exposed to vehicular traffic. Class II Aggregate Base is required under sidewalk exposed to vehicular traffic (i.e. driveway).

3. Item Nos. 9 and 10 – Please confirm contractor will furnish AND install water meter boxes only, heavy gauge post and mail boxes. Please provide mailbox and post standard detail.

Response: Item No. 9 – Contractor shall provide and install new water meter boxes per City Std. W-9 and Attachment 5. Contractor shall remove and replace existing Water Meter Box, grade in and around water meter box, compact, grade and set water meter box to match existing/new sidewalk. Contractor shall repair or replace water meter damaged by Contractor's operation. Contractor shall immediately notify City representative if a water meter is damaged or in need of repair.

Item No. 10 – Contractor shall remove existing mailbox and replace with USPS (City shall review submittal) "Heavy Duty" Steel Mailbox with Post. Mailbox shall be set in concrete. "Heavy Duty" Steel Mail Box and Post are typically available at a Home Improvement Supply. Contractor shall provide submittals for approval prior to purchase. Refer to the Mailbox Installation Detail Drawing No. 903 included in the addendum.

4. Item No. 8 – How far out from existing curb and gutter lip will roadway have to be R&R? A 12" wide section is typical. Please clarify, provide section detail or description.

Response: Roadway to be removed shall be a minimum of 18" from lip of gutter. Roadway shall be neatly sawcut and removed. Compact and replace Class II Aggregate Base and repave Roadway at new curb and gutter construction. Minimum Roadway section is 4" of PG-70-10 HMA over 6" of compacted Class II Base.

5. Item No. 9 - Please provide model #/dimensions/specs required for water meter box.

Response: Meter Box shall be per City of Coachella Standard W-8 (Attachment 4). Please refer to Attachment 5 for model # and specifications of water meter box.

6. Item No. 1 - Provisions and technical specs page 172 states "Contractor shall apply and install project construction signs mounted in an acceptable manner." What is meant to by "apply"? Please clarify who will furnish (2 ea.) city project and (2 ea.) CDBG signs.

Response: Please refer to pg. 78, Article 67 of the General Conditions. For Projects \$25,000 or over the Contractor shall provide two (2) City Project sign boards and two (2) CDBG Project sign boards to be located as directed by the Owner. The sign boards shall be mounted in an acceptable manner and constructed as shown and specified in Exhibit 1 and Exhibit B-3. Additional information can be added to the project sign at the request of the project sponsor.

The Bidder is hereby notified; Addendum No. 1 must be acknowledged as stipulated under Section "INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS", <u>ADDENDA OR BULLETINS</u>, and <u>submitted as part of the Bid.</u> Failure to do so shall result in the City designating said bid as "Non-Responsive".

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The body of each wage determination lists the classification and wage rates that have been found to be prevailing for the cited type(s) of construction in the area covered by the wage determination. The classifications are listed in alphabetical order of "identifiers" that indicate whether the particular rate is a union rate (current union negotiated rate for local), a survey rate (weighted average rate) or a union average rate (weighted union average rate).

#### Union Rate Identifiers

A four letter classification abbreviation identifier enclosed in dotted lines beginning with characters other than "SU" or "UAVG" denotes that the union classification and rate were prevailing for that classification in the survey. Example: PLUM0198-005 07/01/2014. PLUM is an abbreviation identifier of the union which prevailed in the survey for this classification, which in this example would be Plumbers. 0198 indicates the local union number or district council number where applicable, i.e., Plumbers Local 0198. The next number, 005 in the example, is an internal number used in processing the wage determination. 07/01/2014 is the effective date of the most current negotiated rate, which in this example is July 1, 2014.

Union prevailing wage rates are updated to reflect all rate changes in the collective bargaining agreement (CBA) governing this classification and rate.

#### Survey Rate Identifiers

Classifications listed under the "SU" identifier indicate that no one rate prevailed for this classification in the survey and the published rate is derived by computing a weighted average rate based on all the rates reported in the survey for that classification. As this weighted average rate includes all rates reported in the survey, it may include both union and non-union rates. Example: SULA2012-007 5/13/2014. SU indicates the rates are survey rates based on a weighted average calculation of rates and are not majority rates. LA indicates the State of Louisiana. 2012 is the year of survey on which these classifications and rates are based. The next number, 007 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. 5/13/2014 indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

Survey wage rates are not updated and remain in effect until a new survey is conducted.

Union Average Rate Identifiers

Classification(s) listed under the UAVG identifier indicate

that no single majority rate prevailed for those classifications; however, 100% of the data reported for the classifications was union data. EXAMPLE: UAVG-OH-0010 08/29/2014. UAVG indicates that the rate is a weighted union average rate. OH indicates the state. The next number, 0010 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. 08/29/2014 indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

A UAVG rate will be updated once a year, usually in January of each year, to reflect a weighted average of the current negotiated/CBA rate of the union locals from which the rate is based.

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#### WAGE DETERMINATION APPEALS PROCESS

- 1.) Has there been an initial decision in the matter? This can be:
- \* an existing published wage determination
- \* a survey underlying a wage determination
- \* a Wage and Hour Division letter setting forth a position on a wage determination matter
- \* a conformance (additional classification and rate) ruling

On survey related matters, initial contact, including requests for summaries of surveys, should be with the Wage and Hour Regional Office for the area in which the survey was conducted because those Regional Offices have responsibility for the Davis-Bacon survey program. If the response from this initial contact is not satisfactory, then the process described in 2.) and 3.) should be followed.

With regard to any other matter not yet ripe for the formal process described here, initial contact should be with the Branch of Construction Wage Determinations. Write to:

2.) If the answer to the question in 1.) is yes, then an interested party (those affected by the action) can request review and reconsideration from the Wage and Hour Administrator (See 29 CFR Part 1.8 and 29 CFR Part 7). Write to:

The request should be accompanied by a full statement of the interested party's position and by any information (wage payment data, project description, area practice material, etc.) that the requestor considers relevant to the issue.

3.) If the decision of the Administrator is not favorable, an interested party may appeal directly to the Administrative Review Board (formerly the Wage Appeals Board). Write to:

4.) All decisions by the Administrative Review Board are final.
